On this 20th day of November
1832 personally appeared before the Justice
of the Bracken County Court now sitting
Samuel Newby a resident of Martin County
near the Bracken Co.界 line, little State of
aged about 73 years who being duly sworn
according to law doth on his oath make
the following declaration in order to obtain
the benefit of the provision made by the
act of Congress passed June 7th 1832, that
he enlisted in the Army of the United States
in this year 1778 as well as he now recollects
in Capt. Hamby's company with the Light Infantry
in the

Virginia Regiment

At the Virginia line and served under
the following named officers
He resided in the County of Loudon
Va & in the winter of 1778 he enlisted
in the Capt. Hamby Ward a recruiting
Officer for during the war." He has
placed in Capt. Hamby's Company &
marched on to Philadelphia & joined
the main Army under the command
of Genl. Washington. He staid in that
section about 2 months when a large
portion of the Army marched to the
South under the command of Genl.
Greene, he marched through Pennsylvania
Virginia many land in to North Carolina
where stationed in Hillsborough Town
& remained there about 2 months
from thence he march'd to George Town
in South Carolina, from thence he
march'd to Gafford E. Va. Virginia

I was engaged in the battle of Bunker
Hill & defeated by the British - on the
Occassion of the battle Capt. Michael Washington
& Col. Harry Lee were commanders
from there we marched to the Pawtuxet
Springs - I had a battle with the British
defeated them & took about 800 prisoners
from thence we marched to a place
called H. C. I had several of the British
surrounded the fort & went to a place
called the Block house near
Charlestown say 5 or 6 miles we marched
to Charlestown S.C. the British left it &
went to Wilmington,^{S.C.} As I understand
we accompanied at & near Charleston
about 3 or 4 months where we discharged
at that place, I rec'd a pension

objection from Col. Gen Washington
the major having passed his service of 6 months
as I now believe but have lost the
receipts he hereby relinquishes every claim
whatever to a pension or an annuity
except the present and he declares
that his name is not on the pension
roll of any agency in any state.

Joseph ^{Hulme} being duly sworn in open
Court States that before the com-
mencement of the Revolution
he resided in London City and
was well acquainted with the man
named John R. Arbury. He lived one
year in this town the north or the main
this year 1777. & when he returned he
enlisted in the United States army

as I understand from him. & that man
I started under the Army of Washington
as he believes more than three years
when he returned which I think was
after the war was over he had on
his Regimental cap. I have been
acquainted with him many years
in London &c after that time down
this State about 20 years. & he has
generally been reputed to be a
soldier of the Revolution & I have
no doubt he served as he stated
