To the Honorable, The Speaker and Gentleman of the House of Delegates of Virginia \sim

The petition and remonstrance of the Trustees of Alexandria in the County of Fairfax humbly sheweth.

That by an Act of Assembly passed in the year 1748 to erect a Town at the Hunting Creek Warehouse in said County on the lands of Hugh West, Phillip Alexander Sr. & John Alexander reserving the Point on Hugh West's land and the Point on Philip Alexander's land for publick uses. They, the Trustees, in the year 1755 built a warehouse on the land of Phil. Alexander at the expense of One Hund & Fifty Pounds, which in time was paid for out of Money received for some lapsed lots & some funds they formed for the use of the Town, - From that time it became the Property of the Town & has been & now is rented out for the benefit thereof. They have also rented out a small piece of s^d Point to Thomas Flemming, Ship Carpenter for the purpose aforesaid, which in no manner obstructs the landing of Goods but leaves sufficient room for that purpose as well as accommodating merchants with storage etc.

They have also rented out three parcells of Ground on Point West on the land of Hugh West to Thomas Mox ley by 36 feet on Oronoko Street and extending on the Flats & Water 72 feet for 63 years, paying a ground rent as follows....

> For the first 21 years $\pounds 3.12...$ 2^{nd} " " 7.4..... per Annum 3^{rd} " " 14.8...

On the South side of Oronoco Street they have erected a Warehouse by subscription at the expence of $\pounds700 \& upw^d$ the first Story of Stone the 2d Story framed 60 feet Long & 40 feet wide. The Money arising from the rents of s^d House To be applyd to the payment of the Subscribers which being Done, the said House is to become the property of the Town and the future rents arising therefrom to be applyd to such uses as the [illeg] or future Trustees may judge proper

These Leases & buildings. Oronoko Street between them is 66. feet wide and from the buildings.
